EDITORIAL.

Though it is the prerogative of youth to be revolutionary, the policy of the Magazine Committee has been evolutionary, rather than revolutionary. We have, nevertheless, undertaken what was considered to be necessary reform. Thus, this issue is a product of specialisation and co-ordination, a Sub-Editor having been responsible for the success of each section of magazine work, resulting, we hope, in a more carefully prepared publication. It has been one of the ambitions of many Committees to have our journal in circulation before the end of the Summer term, we too share this aim. The cover has again been subject to alteration; we have not, however, seen fit to change the title of these pages, beyond, for the benefit of a wider field of readers, the addition of—The Magazine of the Midland Agricultural College. Innovations are a brief College Calendar, and a sprinkling of pen and ink sketches (a line on which the magazine could profitably develop in future years). An appeal for "Letters to the Editor" met with no response. It must be that our readers are satisfied with the magazine, the College, and agriculture in general; or perhaps, being farmers, their silence means more than satisfied. It is to be hoped that my successor will not be buried in letters.

THE PRINCIPAL'S REVIEW.

The past session has been a specially interesting one in the history of the College. A full measure of prosperity has been enjoyed, and this has been reflected in the extension of the College, the record number of students in residence and also by the sound financial position that obtains. It is a reliable generalisation that a sound educational centre is one that is always in the process of development. By these standards the Midland College compares more than favourably with any other equivalent educational centre in the country. The declared policy of the Governors is to create in the Midland province a centre of higher agricultural teaching that in efficiency and equipment is equal to all the needs that arise. Progress along these lines is apt to be determined by the amount of financial support enjoyed by the College. As a result of increased grants from various sources and a full compliment of students in recent years it has been possible to make considerable headway towards realising essential ambitions.

College organization and government is probably a secondary consideration with students, except in so far as it affects their conditions of life while in residence. There is a deeper significance, however, to be attached to life at a residential College than the mere acquisition of technical knowledge. The purpose of education is far wider than the accumulation of knowledge that is calculated to improve the efficiency of those able to apply it. The agriculturist of the past has been criticised frequently because of his isolationist outlook. His interests have been strongly individualistic, and with this background it has not been easy to re-organize agriculture along those lines that have proved to be satisfactory in other industries. To be able to appreciate other viewpoints than one's own is essential in a community where so many rival interests are concerned.

These aspects of modern life have to be duly considered, and to those who are completing their courses of study with the end of the present term, it is hoped that the experiences of the past year or two will prove to be of real benefit. There is much more that one would like to see associated with the student's life

in the College than is possible at present. The intensive character of most of the courses of instruction means that there is little time available to devote to the purely cultural needs of the student community. An attempt has been made to introduce other than technical topics by means of the series of Sunday Evening Lectures in the two winter terms. Some disappointment has to be confessed with regard to the general response to these lectures, though the titles of the lectures seemed to make a great difference to the attendance.

The cultivation of the team spirit is a further essential in the training of the agriculturist of to-morrow. College life may not always achieve this unless a competitive team element is introduced. This is where the true virtue of sport is recognised. Sport that encourages co-operation with and pride in others can generally be counted upon to promote an influence for good. The team spirit was notably emphasised on Sports Day, when the inter-county rivalry was specially marked.

Of the items associated with the session of 1935-36 that call for special comment, the record number of 80 men in residence might have proved embarrassing but for the fact that it was possible to utilise an empty wing of the Women's Hostel. Actually the women's hostel has only been full once since it was erected in 1928, and our total of 36 in the present session is the lowest on record. The accession of strength in the male student's population is again quite a characteristic feature of the experience gained in recent years. It would be unsound to read into the figures the suggestion that there is little future for women in agricultural pursuits. Thus the principal decline is in respect of poultry students, and it is of more than ordinary interest that the demand for trained poultry workers is in excess of the supply. Arising out of the congestion in accommodating men students, a new hostel has been started to provide an extra twenty-one bedrooms, while during the Summer Vacation, the dining hall and the large conference hall above are to be extended. It is not intended that these extensions, which are costing £8,200, will result in a still further increase in the numbers of students. Their main purpose is to provide better accommodation for the normal numbers experienced.

AN ASCENT OF KILIMANJARO.

The path to the summit of Kilimanjaro is not a particularly difficult one. It can be taken after driving up a tortuous mountain road which passes through native holdings planted with maize, bananas and coffee. The drive gives the climber a start of some 6,000 feet, which actually counts for little since the real battle is one against altitude. Thereafter he plods his way up steep narrow elephant tracks through the rain forest which girdles the mountain. In that forest it is dark, damp and cool, and as the uppermost limits are approached, the surroundings have a ghoulis appearance, since the spectre-like trees are bedecked with long greyish-green lichens suggestive of old men's beards. At 9,000 feet one emerges into open grassy country with copses of giant heather, and after a short while gratefully reposes in a tin shanty called Johanne's Hut. At least such was the attitude of a friend and myself who made this trip last February.

The next day we followed the porters carrying our scanty loads across delightful rolling country, which later had more stunted vegetation, chiefly heather, as the higher altitudes were reached. Flowers were profuse, seneciss (giant grounsel) and giant lobelias growing near streams were seen for the first time. This stage ends at Peter's Hut, a cosy nook perched on the mountain side about the 12,000 feet line. Often it is bleak and cold, especially when enveloped in cloud, though usually it is clear in the early morning when one overlooks a gleaming white billowy sea of clouds below. At this height I began to feel the effects of the altitude.

Some people spend two nights at Peter's Hut in order to become acclimatised to the rarefied atmosphere. We did likewise and amused ourselves on the second day by exploring the foot of Mawenzi (17,650 feet), the second peak of Kilimanjaro. On the way back we were caught in a blizzard. It is good advice to retard the climbing rate to well within one's capacity; by

decided to discontinue the appointment of a paid Secretary. The Meeting discussed the drop in attendance at the Reunion, the suggestion that the name of the Association should be altered, and a proposal that the colours of the Association should be changed. It was decided that, given the permission of the Principal, a Reunion Dinner and Dance should be held at College in December, 1936, and that the colours should remain unchanged. On the instructions of that Meeting, the opinion of members with regard to the name of the Association and the Reunion has been sought in a questionnaire which was sent to all members in February. It was reported that the Association had made a donation of five guineas to the Dr. Milburn Memorial Fund, which has been used in providing bookcases in the Library. The Meeting ended with appreciation of the interest taken by the Principal in the affairs of the Association, of the hospitality given, through him, by the Governing Body, and of the continued interest of the Matron.

More persons than ever before were invited to the Annual Athletic Sports, on May 23rd. With the help of the Sub-Committee, an invitation from the Principal was sent to all past or present members of the Association, and to all others who left the College in the years since 1929. About 140 old students accepted the invitation. The Principal also invited all present members to the Dance in the evening, at which those present enjoyed the free hospitality of the College. The Principal's invitation and the kindness of the Students' Association were greatly appreciated.

With the invitation to Sports Day was a letter from the Principal indicating his desire to keep in touch with old students and to see the Association grow, and a letter from the Secretary. The increase in present membership is largely due to those letters, but we hope to see more new members than the 22 who have joined this year. Also accompanying the invitation to Sports Day was a form on which the Principal sought information on the activities of past students. About 330 replies, by no means all including the completed form, have been received to the 1036 letters despatched. We hope the other 700 people will take the forms from their desks and send them along as soon as possible.

In due course we hope to send the Principal's letter to all other past students—a task that is unlikely to be repeated.

We would remind members and non-members that the only way of being sure to keep in touch with College is to pay their O.K.A. subscriptions regularly—and to notify changes of address. Incidentally, early payment of the subscriptions greatly reduces the unnecessary demands on the Secretary's time. Regular payment is ensured by filling up a Banker's Order Form, which we shall be pleased to issue. Life Membership is a great deal cheaper than Annual Membership, carries just the same privileges and saves both Secretary and Treasurer a good deal of work. Details will be sent on request. We should be obliged by word of the addresses of Misses D. M. Norman and D. W. Thomas, and Messrs. C. Daniels and A. White.

It is intended to arrange an enjoyable day at College in September, on which date tennis and other games will be played, facilities for seeing the departments of the College will be available, and a short General Meeting to deal with changes of Rules will be held. Full details will be sent in due course to all members, if the day can be arranged.

The colours of the Association can now be obtained from Messrs. Bailey & Simpkin, Ltd., Market Place, Loughborough, who were appointed official outfitters early this year.

Enamelled brooches of the coat-of-arms will shortly be available at the price of 2/-, from Messrs. Bailey & Simpkin.

PERSONAL NOTES.

The following notes about past and present members of the College, have been compiled from various sources, chief among which are the replies to the Principal's letter mentioned in the Secretary's report. The abbreviations used are :—

A. Agriculture. D. Dairying.
F. Farm Pupil. H. Horticulture.
P. Poultry Husbandry.

The dates are those we have for sessions attended.

G. C. Abbott (1931-33) continues as Assistant Regional Officer to the M.M.B, working in N.W. Derbyshire. After poultry farming, **Miss F. M. Abey** (A.P. 1925-26), is now running a small riding school near Hull. **Miss D. Addison** (P. 1932-33) is managing the pedigree side of the poultry for Mr. W. A. Hebditch of Ticehurst. **K. W. B. Allen** (P. 1933-35) is Student-Instructor in poultry-husbandry at Chelmsford. **Miss E. M. Allison** (D. 1928-30) is still milk analyst for Kirby & West, Leicester. **W. Allison** (D. 1931-32) is now cheese making for the Derby Co-op. **D. Alston** (A. 1930-31) is busy farming in Suffolk. **J. F. Alvy** (P. 1932) has left poultry for insurance work. **Miss M. M. Andrew** (D. 1930) has charge of poultry, including turkeys and guinea fowls, and her work also involves butter making and cream-cheese making. **W. D. Ardern** (D. 1933-35) has been apprenticed to a managerial post with Cheshire Sterilized Milk Co. at Stockport since February. **Miss M. Ashmore** (P. 1929-30) continues to keep poultry and has started to play cricket regularly.

The President of the Association, **G. D. Bailey** (A. 1924-25), has farmed Parks Farm, Nanpanton, in partnership since leaving College. The herd of Ayrshires and the intensive grassland management, both adopted in 1929, have justified themselves. We wanted him to permit us to describe his successful methods of attending to his Alfa Laval Milking Machine—but he wouldn't. As an additional outlet for his energy, he has taken over the management of another grass farm, at Cropstone. He has been Hon. Sec. of the Loughborough Young Farmers' Discussion Society for seven years, and County Chairman for two years; and in his post as Hon. Secretary of the Loughborough Agricultural Association, which he took over for three months, four years ago; he has helped to put the Society on a sound financial footing. And all this is despite, or probably because, he is "still in digs and becoming thoroughly hardened and landlady

proofed." **W. L. Baker** (A. 1930-32) has been principal agent for Silcocks at Doncaster for the past three years. **Miss M. W. Bailey** (P. 1930-31) is at home managing about 500 laying stock, and rearing about 400 chickens this season. **J. W. Banner** (A.P. 1930-31) is farming at home and specialising in forced crop culture—mushrooms being his mainstay. **F. Bartram** (A.D. 1934-35) and **W. R. Blackburn** (A. 1928-29) are milk recording in Sussex. **G. Bartram** (A.D. 1929-32) is farms supervisor on the Montrose farms of Chivers & Sons (4 farms: 1250 acres, including acres of raspberries and seed potatoes, and winter feeding. We hear that he is about to be married. **F. H. Bath** (D.A. 1909-12) is with the Leics. Colliery & Pipe Co. at Coleorton. **Miss K. M. Batty** (D. 1932-33) is managing a dairy in Berkshire. **F. Baxter** (H. 1930-31) was appointed Temporary Assistant Horticultural Inspector in Devonshire last Autumn. **A. C. Beard** (A. 1919-1920) continues farming 425 acres (300 arable) in Durham—corn, potatoes, etc; 30 cows, 80 winter fattening beasts and 100 breeding ewes. **G. N. Beckett** (A. 1930) is partner in the firm who act as agents for All Souls' College, Oxford. **Miss M. J. Beech** (D. 1925-26) has been companion help to a lady since 1928, but is still keenly interested in Dairying and everything connected with College. **D. Bell** (A.D. 1919-22), who joined United Dairies (Wholesale) Ltd. in 1922, has been Manager of their Wootton Bassett Branch since 1927. He feels "a little older, larger in girth and less active in motion—more suited to Bridge and Snooker than the violent exercise of hockey." He has met **F. D. Atteridge** (A. 1920-23) at Bristol. **Miss G. E. Bellamy** (D.P. 1923-25) is manageress of the Lindsey and Kesteven Laying Trials, to which she went from Cambridge-shire in 1929. **Miss L. Sowden** (P.D. 1930-31) is her assistant. **Miss R. Bennetts** (D. 1932-33) is still making Leicester cheese at Aston Flamville. Holland Laying Trials are still under the care of **Miss M. E. Bettinson** (P. 1930-31). In September last, **G. R. H. Bishop** (A.D. 1928-30; 32-33) was appointed Dairy Instructor at Sparsholt. **K. C. Bishop** (A. 1919-20) has been farming about 360 acres at Harthill with his brother, since 1925. The 200 acres of arable, worked on a four-course, fold 150-200 sheep and give 100 acres corn. The grass carries about 30 cows and about 70 other stock, and there are always 100 pigs on the farm. **J. Blackwall** (A. 1926-28) has been in the gravel trade since leaving College, and is now a Branch Manager for the Hilton Gravel Co. He also has an estate of about 700 acres which he

tries to run economically in his spare time. His tenants are engaged almost exclusively in milk production. **L. H. Bland** (F. 1930), who was married last autumn, is managing the "Manus" Milking Machine business at the Ellesmere Branch of Fullwood & Bland. **Mrs. L. M. Blencowe** (**I. F. Robinson**, D.P. 1924-26) writes of the keen interest she and her husband take in farming, and of their hope of adding a farm to their flourishing country butcher's business. **F. A. Boddy** (H. 1930-31) obtained his 1st Class Senior R.H.S. in 1934, and has just recently been appointed to a post under the Superintendent of Parks at Salford. **F. R. Bonshor** (A. 1921-23) is livestock farming near Belvoir, and finds that his family of four keeps him fairly well occupied. **Miss B. J. Bowman** (D. 1934-35) is working under **Miss I. L. Copp** (D. 1928-29) in the Wyn Lodge Dairy at Wysall, bottling certified milk. They find an Alfa Laval combine milker a great boon. We are happy to keep in touch with **Mrs. A. M. E. Bowmer** (D. 1897, '02-'03; '06 and **Miss E. M. Draper** (1901-02), who retired from Leicester cheese making on 1921. **Miss I. Brackenbury** (P. 1929-30) is responsible for some 6000 head of poultry for Messrs. Dennis at Sutterton. She finds the work a little more exacting with a staff of four boys than at Col. Dean's, where there were 16 men and girls for about three or four times the number of stock. **Miss R. M. Bradfield** (D. 1922-24) is playing a good goal at hockey. **F. Brener** (F. 1929-31) has never regretted giving up farming and taking up the study of massage and allied subjects. He practices in Nottingham. **R. D. H. Bridge** (P. 1925-26) is now Poultry Instructor in Wiltshire. **Mrs. Briant** (**E. M. Spurr**, D.P. 1919-21) is now in Cheshire and will be glad to see O.K.'s of her years. **Mrs. L. M. Briggs** (**E. M. Bourne**, D. 1929-30) writes of their 150 acres of mixed farming. They separate all their milk for butter making and rearing pure-bred L.R. calves, dishorned at birth. After spending five years farming, **R. Brighton** (A. 1919-20) was accepted into the Methodist Ministry, in which he is serving at Slough. **Miss H. Broadbent** (H. 1922-23) is now resident in New Zealand. **P. D. Brooks** (D. 1929-31) has been in the Argentine for the last four years, where he has cleared and planted a small holding. **B. Brown** (A. 1932-33) is on a farm at Garstang. **Miss D. M. Brown** (D. 1932) has charge of the poultry and helps with the dairy and the other manifold activities of the farm at home. **Mr. J. A. Brown** (A. 1924-26) is "introducer" for B.O.C.M. Ltd., and breeds L.W. pigs. **Mrs. Brown** (**A. K. Johnson**, P. 1924-25) manages somehow to look after her husband and three kiddies,

to run a poultry farm, specialising in pedigree R.I.R.'s and Brown Leghorns, to breed Elkhounds as a side line and to fill her spare time with W.I. work. **N. A. Brown** (A. 1934-35) started in business on his own account as a corn and cake merchant in June. **R. H. Browne** (1929-31) describes himself as a sort of glorified working foreman on a profit-sharing basis on the farm of Mr. W. S. Abbott. He will always be pleased to see anyone connected with the College if they care to have a look round a well-known farm. **Miss S. V. Brown** (D. 1931-33) is in the dairy at the Kelham Estate of Messrs. Home Grown Sugar Ltd. **W. W. Miss S. E. Sampson (D. 1930-31), who has been housekeeper-dairymaid to her brother since leaving College, expects to be looking for another post shortly. **J. C. Saville** (A. 1930-32) is assistant to a firm of auctioneers and estate agents in Chesterfield, with a view to a partnership. **Miss D. Scott** (H. 1934-35) is working at home, milking regularly, looking after the chickens and the garden, and making herself "generally useful in the house." **Mrs. E. H. Selby** (G. A. Bell, P. 1919-20) had a poultry-farm of her own from 1922 to 1924, when she was married. Miss K. M. Sharpe (D. 1928) is in charge of the new dairy at Denton Manor Farm, which is the head farm of Culverthorpe Dairy Farms Ltd. **A. E. M. Shepherd** (A.D. 1913-15) is farming, and taking an active part in local government, in Sutton Bonington. **Miss M. J. Shepherd** (P. 1933), with very heavy heart, left poultry-farming last year, to study Domestic Science, which seemed to offer more, financially and socially. Mixed farming, with turnip hogs, 1000 laying birds and about a dozen outdoor sows, and yard feeding, summarises his farming activities. **G. B. Smith** (P. 1934-35) is assistant on a poultry-farm near Yarmouth, the 1200 adult head being worked by the manageress and herself. **Miss S. M. L. Smith** (D. 1927-30) is head of her department in the labs. of Midland Counties Dairy. **Mrs. R. Smith** (**E. G. Martin**, P. 1928) is poultry-farming. She has a son. **Miss V. G. Smith** (H. 1934-35) was appointed Garden Secretary of the Canning Town Women's Settlement, E.13, in March—a job with varied interests, involving generally beautifying housing estates and slums. "Visitors welcomed." **J. A. Snowball** (A. 1930-31) is in charge of a dairy near Beccles, where his pastime is to try to solve the problems presented by tithe and the sugar-beet factories' orders. Before that, he was in charge of several good herds, one of which won a B.O.C.M. herd yield competition, with 1961 gallons average. **H. G. Stableford** and **G. J. Matthews** (A. 1933-35) are clerk-assistants to the manager of the King's College Farms at Worlaby and Elsham. **C. A. Stanger** (D. 1931-33) is manager of the

Five Oaks Certified Dairy Farm at Stanford-on-Soar. We hear of his marriage to Miss Tudhope. **A. A. Stanton** (A. F. 1929-32) is in East Africa. **C. F. Stenson** (A.D. 1926-29) is, we hear, managing the M.M.B. Milk Factory at Norwich. **J. H. Stephenson** (A. 1932-34) is now Garton's representative, stationed in Mansfield. **Mrs. H. F. Stephenson** (**K. Barton**, D. 1933) practices dairying at their own farm. **Mrs. G. M. Sterland** (**I. R. Atkinson**, P.D. 1924-25) finds her hands full with a house and a wee daughter. **T.
