Editorial.

Like some of my predecessors—I will not say all!—I am at a complete loss as what to write, so I shall have to drop back to the old dodge of giving a short resumé of the events during this Session.

As can be seen, we are sticking to the new design of the Magazine inaugurated last year. I think few will contradict me when I say that this change has met with general approval. As we are now the proud possessors of a coat of arms, there is nothing like showing it off to the best advantage. The blazers, ties, and pullovers which incorporate the College colours have proved quite popular, and are selling well. While a small edition of the badge has been adopted by the Cricket Club to denote possessors of colours, the other clubs have decided upon a scroll, which, if plain, is quite effective.

Several changes have again occurred during this year on the Staff. Mr. H. Hall has been appointed permanent lecturer in engineering in the place of Mr. Drew, who left at the end of the 1929-30 Session. Thus, special engineering courses have again been established. Mr. Maw has filled the place vacated by Mr. Ballardie, who also left at the end of the Summer Term. Miss Lamb left during the Spring Term, Miss Cragg, who was helping Mr. Cranfield, taking her place. Miss Sellers is helping in the dairy while Miss Pritchard is away, who we are sorry to say has had to undergo an operation, but we are glad to see that she is going on well.

Mr. 'Flu paid the Men's Hostel an unwelcome visit this year, and the majority of the residential staff were unfortunate enough to succumb to his activities, also several students.

The Dramatic Society were unable to stage a play this year, due to lack of time, as it was decided to attempt it in the Spring Term. We are assured, however, that if sufficient talent is forthcoming, a play will be arranged during the next Christmas Term.

The Sporting activities of the College has maintained its usual spirit of enthusiasm, especially the Hockey team, which, although unable to run a second eleven this year, had an extremely good first team. The Cricket team, while being better than last year, does not, on the whole, show the same *esprit-de-corps*, but appears to be improving. Great interest has been shown in the ping-pong, a number of matches having been played between the two hostels. Very poor sportsmanship has been shown by users of the billiard table—besides ruining the cloth, some players have been unwilling to pay for their games. As the table is still in debt, it behoves every user to pay up like a sportsman, and thus keep the table in decent order for present and future students. As profits were dropping from the canteen, it was decided to open it three times daily, also to widen the variety of stock kept; this, we learn, has been successful, the returns showing a more favourable aspect. It is hoped that all students will patronise the canteen as much as possible, as it is from this source that most of the grants come for the various Clubs.

We should like to congratulate all those who were successful in passing the recent N.D.A. Examination and other exams which appear to crop up at various times.

Before closing we wish to thank Mr. Marshall for presenting a cup in the name of his son in recognition of his athletic achievements.

Finally, we wish to tender our grateful thanks to all those who have sent in contributions for the Magazine or have helped in its production in any way. Although contributions from the Women's Hostel have again been rather scarce, this year it is hoped that next year will see an improvement in that direction.

Old Kingstonian Association, 1930-1931.

Up to the time of going to press, 174 members have paid their current subscriptions. This number includes 70 life members. Compared with last year the number of "paid-up" members shows a decrease of 38. Members are again reminded that subscriptions for 1931 became due on January 1st, 1931. Over a hundred members have paid their 1930 subscriptions, but have omitted to forward their 1931 subscriptions, and in accordance with Rule 4, the magazine will not be forwarded to such members.

Accommodation was taxed to its utmost limits at the Reunion Dinner and Dance on December 19th, 1930. Owing to lack of space it was impracticable to attempt to cater for more than 100 guests at the Dinner, and it was for this reason that tickets could not be supplied to several members who applied for them immediately prior to the Reunion. In view of the increasing popularity of this function it is suggested that members wishing to attend should apply for tickets a reasonable length of time beforehand as otherwise they may be disappointed. Thanks are due to the Governing Body and the Principal for again providing accommodation, to Miss Nicholson for the capable way in which the arrangements were made and carried and last, but not least, to those resident members of the Association who devoted much of their time to the preparations which are essential for the successful issue of an affair of this kind.

The Ninth Annual General Meeting was held the following morning. Officers for the current year were elected, a list of whom appears earlier in this magazine. Other important business transacted at this meeting has already been reported to members.

Essay Prize.—At the Annual General Meeting it was decided that owing to the lack of response shown in previous years no Essay Prize would be offered for competition during 1931.
